After graduating from Stanford in 1999 he helped found [College 411.com](http://College411.com), a startup focused on supporting and connecting college students that was acquired by Student Advantage Inc. in 2000. In 2001, Nate returned to Stanford to work in financial management in Residential Education. Since then, he has held numerous positions in Residential Education, most recently Associate Dean and Executive Director for the Undergraduate Residential Experience, where he worked closely with Row houses, fraternity and sorority life and auxiliary finance. Nate now serves as Special Assistant to the Office of the Vice Provost for Student Affairs and is the Resident Fellow for West Lagunita House with his wife Anne.
